The structure of the organization allows for systematic reporting to the concerned superiors, both academic and administrative, use of computers, software for admission, attendance and online registration for university examination and uploading of internal assessment marks etc. The college has its own management information system which serves the primary purpose of providing the important information about the various aspects related to teaching faculty, their qualifications, contribution, the office staff, the library, the books and volumes, the students, the nature of their admission, results and achievements. Biometric attendance is maintained for both the teaching and the non teaching faculty. The e pay roll system is followed for the salary of teaching and the non teaching staff. The CCTV Surveillance helps in the administration of the institution to monitor and control various academic and non academic activities. The e-governance administrative mechanism is successfully used in conveying decisions taken by the Management, Principal and different committees. The institution also maintains the Financial Accounts and Auditing which is done by the Chartered Accountant appointed by the Management once in every three months. All these records are maintained digitally by our College Accounts section. Thus MIS of our college is actively being utilized for administrative and financial management.</p>

The college is affiliated to Karnatak University, Dharwad and follows the academic curriculum prescribed by the university. The academic calendar of the college is based on the calendar provided by the university. Mechanism for the well planned curriculum delivery consists of :

- Distribution of syllabi among the departments and in turn among teachers.
- Allocation of subject papers within each department
- Preparation of action plans taking into consideration of objectives of the curriculum, the number of teachers and students and infrastructure available.
- Before the commencement of the academic year, the time table committee prepare the master time table of the college and ensure effective and timely implementation the curriculum through infrastructural planning in terms of aspects such as number of classrooms and academic resources.
- Preparation of departmental and individual teachers' time tables.
- Preparation of teaching plan and teaching schedule and course outlines of each class.
- Departmental internal subject meetings are held to ensure the subject specific objectives are imbibed within broad academic framework. The process of delivery, pace, assessment and periodical reviews of curriculum progression are decided and discussed in the internal subject meeting which are then documented in the form of minutes.
- The academic plan is transitioned into effective action through lectures, presentations, assignments, seminars, tutorials, project works, workshops and discussions. Documentation is maintained the form of attendance records and analysis.
- Teaching through ICT enables techniques.
- Conduct of interactive sessions at the end of class room teaching sessions.
- Organising field studies and study tours by departments, wherever is necessary and possible.
- Identification of laggard and slow learners and conducting apt remedial coaching for such students. Motivate advanced learners by providing updated knowledge related to the subject.
- Arrangement for student-teacher guardian arrangements, whereby each guardian teacher focuses on individual students.
- Maintenance of daily work diaries by all teachers.
- Procurement of books in respect of new subject papers introduced or syllabi revised. The curriculum is suitable enriched to be representative of stakeholders' expectations in catering to the needs of the society and economy. Special lecture programmers, workshops and seminars by eminent personalities from academics, corporate sector, policy making bodies and media are conducted regularly to enhance the curriculum to be a more effective. Yes, the IQAC had taken the initiative of implementing the mentoring of students. The system promises to provide a better understanding of individual students and bring out their highest potential. The mentoring format is prepared by the IQAC to ensure uniformity. It is functioning with the following aims and objectives. 1. To strengthen the student and teacher relationship. 2. To support the mentee in meeting the academic requirements 3. To identify and encourage advanced learners. 4. To help students to identify and pursue opportunities for employment related to their degrees. S.O.P. (Standard operating Procedures) 1. To involve all the teachers to act as mentors. 2. To maintain the records of the system 3. To meet periodically to discuss the mentoring style. 4. To analyse the performance of the mentee and plan for improvisation. Based on the strength the students are divided into groups of 20 to 25 students depending on the number of students. Each group is assigned a teacher mentor who would perform mentoring duties and obviously students have the same mentor for all the 3 years of his/her study to ensure expert guidance. Responsibilities 1. Mentors maintain and update the mentoring format, which contains space for entering particulars and performance of students (IA tests, attendance, participation, strength, weaknesses and measures taken by the mentor etc). 2. After collecting all necessary information, mentors are expected to offer guidance and counselling as and when required. 3. Mentors meet students at regular intervals. 4. If a student is identified as slow learner it is the duty of the mentor to inform the concerned subject teacher. 5. If situation demands mentors contact parents/guardians. 6. Appropriate measures are taken by the mentor considering the strength and weaknesses of the students. 7. Students are also advised in their career development/professional guidance. OUTCOME 1. Strengthens personal acquaintance between mentor and mentee. 2. Increases in the pass percentage of the institution. 3. Reduction in drop out rate 4. Improvement in students performance and attendance. At the sem end the convenor meets all mentors to review the functioning of the system and the same is informed to the head of the institution.

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2.5.2 – Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

The Institutions Continuous Internal Evaluation system focuses on the all round development of the students. The main purpose is to improve both teaching and

learning and to groom the students' competency for the higher studies job market. Hence it is essential to evaluate internal and external performance of the students. As per the instructions of the affiliated university the evaluation is done by conducting I.A Tests and Home Assignments. Apart from this continuous evaluation is done through student's participation in Curricular, Cocurricular and Extra Curricular activities. The semester system enables us with limited provision for the strict adoption of this system. Even then the institution has made some reforms in CIE to evaluate the student's progress and potentiality. 1. Students' Mentoring System The mentor monitors the performance, analyses the result and necessary feedback is given to the students and the concerned subject teacher. The weaknesses and the strength are identified and adequate measures are adopted to strengthen the weaknesses and to encourage the strength. 2 Parents Meeting The performance of the students is discussed with the parents they are also asked to monitor their wards and take remedial measures if needed. 3. Remedial classes are conducted for the slow learners to update their subject knowledge. 4. Provision for the Reexamination to the absentees on genuine basis. These reforms have resulted in substantial improvement in students' performance, enhanced writing skills, pass percentage and academic excellence of students.

The present competitive era expects every educational institution to provide necessary skills and additional knowledge along with the prescribed syllabus. To meet out this expectation a systematic calendar of events becomes essential. However, the institution has its share in making the necessary changes and development in the curricular with few of changing circumstances, through its senior faculty members and members of board of studies.

Teaching and Learning

In order to promote higher education in teaching and learning, procedures practiced are: 1. The teaching learning process is facilitated through qualified, trained and experienced faculty. 2. Procuring the recent books, volumes and journals in the library for both teachers and students for updating their knowledge. 3. Providing opportunities for the faculty members and the students for research and for presenting the papers in various conferences/seminars at various levels. 4. For promoting learning, students are identified on the basis of their performances care is taken for promoting failure and slow learners through special and remedial classes.

Examination and Evaluation

1. Ours is an aided institution. So we have very little share either in bringing out changes or in improvements in the examinations and evaluation aspects. 2. However, whenever situation demands, we always bring to the notice of University authorities for bringing about the changes in schedules of the examination, pattern of question paper, number of scripts to be assessed per day. 3. Two internal tests of 20 marks each are conducted per semester to evaluate the learning process of students. Test marks are communicated to students.

Research and Development

Research and Development is a significant factor to improve the quality of higher education, so the institution always encourages its faculty members for processing research by way of providing them with the deputation facilities, through FIP. The institution keenly encourages the faculty members to participate in different academic and research activities. Our college provides

1) I. Title of practice: social welfare practice of free blood group typing Blood donation camps. II. Aim Objective: 1. To encourage students to being better human beings and being responsible citizens, to sensitize students and to inculcate humanitarian and ethical values. 2. To encourage people to donate blood voluntarily without compensation 3. To raise awareness that individuals can save lives and improve the health of others by donating blood. 4. To support the operation of safe and reliable blood services which aids in reducing child mortality, improving the health of pregnant woman, fighting against diseases cancer, AIDS, Malaria/Dengue etc. III. Context: The accurate grouping of blood is important during blood transfusion. If the transfused

blood doesn't match the recipient's blood, it leads to clumping of blood inside the body which leads to immediate death. Blood typing is the test which determines the blood group of an individual, and it is essential when one is in need of blood transfusion or planning to donate blood, hence it is vital to know the blood group. Along with saving lives, there are a number of reasons why donating blood is important. A single blood donation can save three lives.

One blood donation provides different blood components than can help up to three different people. Blood is needed every 2 seconds. Nearly more than 20 million people are transfused with blood every year in India. As donated blood gets screened after donation, one can get to know if there is any disease or disorders in the physiology. Blood donation gives life and keeps the donor healthy rejuvenate the blood cells, helps in weight reduction, increased life span. Blood donation is one of the most significant contributions that a person can make towards the society and it is also the sign of humanity that unites people irrespective of caste creed religion. We organize free blood group typing in rural / sub rural areas and free blood donation on the campus on regular basis. We also have Memorandum of understanding with the KLE's Blood Bank to organize blood camps and awareness camps/activities. IV. Challenges faced: Ignorance, fear and lack of voluntary blood donation were the major constraints especially in the students. Providing proper moralization of the safety involved and basics to be able to donate the blood and the need for blood donation in the society were the challenges faced. V. Evidence of success: The numbers of donor volunteers have subsequently increased during the years. To conclude blood donation appreciates the blood donors for their contributions towards the society. 2) I. Title of the practice: Regular campus cleaning by the students and staff on every Saturday. II. Aim and objective: For a long time it has been an important part of our institutions to teach our children from young age, virtues such as cleaning up after themselves, discipline and sensitivity/responsibility about the surroundings. When such ideal practices are habituated the ideal root characters of the young minds are strengthened to become responsible citizens. III. Context: Students have a mass clean up session on every Saturday for an hour before dismissal in our institutions. These processes aim to make them respect their surroundings and refrain from making a mess as they will be the ones cleaning them. It also puts all students regardless of social status or wealth on an equal footing.
